Other native plants not on the Master Table:		
– most tiny plants, especially tiny flowers		
– low landscaping potential (unattractive, very difficult to grow, etc.)		
– not native to southern part of WV ecoregion		
– rare or very uncommon		
– highly poisonous		
– parasitic or hemiparasitic on other plants		
– spread too readily		
– very little information

Populus trichocarpa	Black Cottonwood	Invasive root system. Tree breaks more readily than most.
Taxus brevifolia	Pacific Yew

Calochortus uniflorus		
Calypso bulbosa	Lady Slipper Orchid	Difficult to establish. More common slightly higher in elev.
Circaea alpina ssp. pacifica	Enchanter's Nightshade	Very weedy; easily spreads beyond control.
Cirsium brevistylum	Short-styled Thistle	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Cirsium edule var. edule	Edible Thistle	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Cirsium remotifolium var. odontolepis	Mountain Thistle	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Cirsium remotifolium var. remotifolium	Remote-leaved Thistle	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Clematis ligusticifolia	Western Virgin's Bower	Little known.
Epilobium ciliatum ssp. ciliatum	Common Western Willowherb	Pretty weedy. Unlikely to have any garden value.
Epilobium ciliatum ssp. glandulosum	Glandular Willowherb	Somewhat weedy.
Hieracium albiflorum	White-flowered Hawkweed	Somewhat weedy.
Hieracium parryi	Parry's Hawkweed	Little known.
Madia gracilis	Slender Tarweed	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Madia sativa	Coast Tarweed	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Ranunculus uncinatus	Little Buttercup	Somewhat weedy in appearance.
Rubus leucodermis var. leucodermis	Blackcap Raspberry	Substantial curved thorns.
Rubus ursinus	Trailing Blackberry	Unattractive, difficult to control, thorny, impediment to walking.
